Sexton Building Contract.

H. R. Douglas, Inc., has been awarded the contract for the construction of the new Sexton building in State street on the site of the Cady property in which a building collapsed nearly a year ago. The new building is to occupy not only the space on which stood the old Cady building, but a portion of the Copp building adjoining it, which included the right of way between the Cady and Copp buildings. The site was recently purchased by James T. Sexton of the firm of McMahon & Sexton, clothiers, and who occupy the store in the Copp building.

The Sexton building is to be of brick and terra cotta construction. It will have a frontage of about 26 feet and a depth of 110 feet, being three stories high. The ground floor will contain a store to be occupied by Mr. Sexton for his clothing business and the two upper floors will contain offices. The building will be on colonial style and will be the only building of this style in State street, with the possible exception of the post office which is along colonial lines.
