

Hypothetical Line of Descent of Lancelot Larkham of Rhode Island and Connecticut from Reverend Thomas Larkham of Tavistock and Lancelot Fletcher of Tallantire



Her connection is speculative:

- She is recorded as dying one month after Lancelot Larkham on 20 Oct 1709 at Saint Mary Aldermary Church. Her record states, "Eliz: Larkham, a Lodger at Mr. Davis's in Bay's Inn Lane, in the Churchyard." (London, England, Church of England Baptisms, Marriages and Burials, 1538-1812)
- Thomas and Frances Larkham named their daughter Elizabeth, which may be significant.

- Likely named for his maternal grandfather, Lancelot Fletcher
- 6 March 1683 completed an apprenticeship as a London Upholder (*Upholders' Company records, 1704-1772*)
- 21 June 1685, named as Lancelot Larkham, son of George Larkham of Cockermouth, and bequeathed Rev. Thomas Larkham's (his grandfather) sealing ring by his cousin Thomas Larkham. (*Prerogative Court of Canterbury, 1686-1693*)
- Infant daughter Mary Larkham (named as daughter of Lancelot) buried 28 July 1707 at St. Mary's Battersea (*London, England, Baptisms, Marriages and Burials, 1538-1812*)
- Buried at St. Olave Church, Bermondsey on 21 Sep 1709 (*London Metropolitan Archives*)

- Named in Rev. George Larkham's will as grandson, Thomas, son of Lancelot. Bequeathed £10 "in order to his bringing up to some trade" (*Carlisle Library, Cumbria, UK*)
- Placed in a tailor apprenticeship by his uncle, Deliverance Larkham (son of Rev. George Larkham), in July 1710 after his parents died in 1709. Deliverance paid exactly £10 that Rev. George Larkham left for his grandson (*UK Apprenticeship Books*)
- Arrived in South Kingstown, RI ca. 1728. Associated with the tailor Aaron Milliman and Case family (*South Kingstown Land Records*).
- Died 4 Sep 1746 in King George's War (*RI Muster Rolls*).

- Likely named for his grandfather and gg-grandfather.
- Placed in an apprenticeship by his mother in 1749 after his father died in 1746. (*Larkham Family Records; Richmond, RI Probate Records*)
